Throughout history, Americans have turned to music in our hardest moments. Songs like Simple Gifts and Zion's Walls grew out of communities seeking hope and belonging. Shenandoah carries the longing and beauty of early American life, while Indian Summer captures the nostalgia of seasons changing as we enter this time of reflection. The Peace of Wild Things offers a moment of quiet refuge, reminding us that even in times of uncertainty, there is stillness and comfort to be found. Will the Circle Be Unbroken has long given Americans strength during loss and hardship, and Light of a Clear Blue Morning celebrates the promise of better days after struggle.

Each of these pieces holds a story of hardship, simplicity, hope, scarcity, abundance, survival, and joy. Together, they create a space where we can honor the many ways Americans have lifted one another up through music.

As you know, this evening's concert is donation based. We chose this intentionally and partnered with Project Angel Heart, an organization devoted to providing medically tailored meals to people in our community who are most in need. It is a privilege to sing, and an even greater privilege to let that gift extend beyond these walls to share warmth, and nourishment with our neighbors. Your presence and generosity help make that possible.

Our hope tonight is to welcome you into a moment of gratitude and connection to remind us of what it means to gather. At our best, we are a community of resilient, hardworking, loving people who share what we have at our table. We are stronger together, and music often brings us back to that truth.

Thank you for taking time out of your busy season to begin the holidays with us. We wish you joy and peace in the weeks ahead. May tonight be a moment of thanks that we carry with us through our holiday season.
